A Message from SHS Superintendent, Dr. James Carlson

When I was a senior in high school, a classmate and I were selected to participate in a pilot program for our servicelearning requirement at Elim Christian School, located in the south suburbs, for students with significant disabilities. Assisting students with physical, mental, and multiple disabilities made a profound impact, but perhaps not as much on those of whom you may be thinking. My classmate and I were certainly providing much needed support; but as I quickly learned, it was these very special children making the impact, and they were making it on us.

Now my parents were unbelievable givers, and, therefore, terrific models for me when I was growing up. I saw daily how one makes an impact. My experience at Elim Christian School, however, showed me that it truly is "in giving that we receive." This truth is certainly not lost on the students and staff at Seneca High School. Making an impact seems to be part of their DNA. Take, for instance, the work of the SHS National Honor Society, which hosted a food drive and raised nearly \$1,300 for Puerto Rico Hurricane Relief.

In the pages to come, you will read about the work of Mr. Terry Maxwell and the Seneca High School Chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and their fine work assisting those in need. You will also learn about a remarkable SHS junior, Marissa Holmes, who is making an impact with her work to support children around the world. These are but a few of the efforts made by students and staff to make an impact.

SHS Senior Dylan Leasure knows much about making an impact. In 2016, Dylan was a recipient of a "wish" by Make-A-Wish Illinois to go to the Pro Bowl in Hawaii and meet Ray Lewis. Make-A-Wish grants wishes for children with lifethreatening medical conditions to enrich their lives with hope. Just last year, Dylan organized a team to raise funds so that others may have wishes granted. He was recently presented a plaque at a school pep rally for his efforts.

Financial Impact

Seneca High School is pleased to present the results of the 2016-17 audited financial statements. With the change in the assessed value of Exelon, the largest taxpayer in the district, the levy percent increase from the previous year's extension will be more than 5%, resulting in a Truth in Taxation Hearing and notice in the paper. As part of the Exelon Agreement, the tax rate for Seneca High School is frozen at 1.79838. Even though the levy request is higher than 5%, please be assured that Seneca High School will abate to 1.79383, which is the exact same tax rate beginning with the 2012 tax levy through 2019 levy request as required by the agreement.














Ms. Karen Raney is a 1983 graduate of Northern Illinois University. The 2017-2018 school year marks her 33rd year of teaching. Ms. Raney has spent two years teaching and coaching at Elgin St. Edward High School (1985-1987) and thirty-one years at Seneca High School. Ms. Raney earned her M.A. degree from Aurora University in 1998. Ms. Raney coached volleyball at Seneca Grade School for seven years, was the Head Varsity Girls Softball Coach at SHS for six years and has been Head Volleyball Coach for thirty-three years, serving thirty-one of those at SHS. When asked to provide professional advice to new teacher's entering the profession, Ms. Raney said, "Excel at your job!! Improve your teaching skills every year of your career. Most of all, be you!"









Mr. Bonner is a 1984 graduate of Northern Illinois University. This school year marks his 33rd year of teaching. Mr. Bonner's teaching positions include spending (1) year at Serena Jr. High School, two years at Shabbona High School and thirty years at Seneca High School. Mr. Bonner has spent his entire teaching career as a Special Education teacher primarily assisting students in the self-contained classroom providing

various academic supports for regular education students. Mr. Wes Bonner coached two years of basketball, three years of football, eleven years of volleyball and twenty-five years of junior and senior high track. Mr. Bonner's professional advice for new teachers entering the field today is, "Show respect. If you show respect, you get respect. No rules needed."



From the Desk of Assistant Principal, Mike Coughlin

The small school environment, along with a caring staff that encourage Students to make good decisions both in and outside of the classroom, makes a positive impact on students.

As the physical and social "home away from home," schools naturally assume a primary role in substance abuse education, prevention, and early identification. Schools have the opportunity to work with parents, health care professionals, and community officials to identify students who show behavioral risks for drug-related problems.

Seneca High School takes its role in providing substance abuse education very seriously. Various activities are held throughout the year to demonstrate the importance of making healthy and smart decisions in life so that dreams and goals can be achieved. For example, we have retained various speakers to address our students on the importance of making good choices. During October, we participate in Red Ribbon Week, the nation's oldest and largest drug prevention program. Likewise, Mr. Jackson and Mrs. Paddock have done an excellent job with TRUST (Teens Resisting Unhealthy Social Temptations) every school year.

Studies show that students who are involved in school activities are less likely to use illegal substances. Seneca High School believes student involvement makes a positive impact in the lives of our students. The wide range of extra-curricular and co-curricular activities offered at Seneca High School is a result of this belief. Last year, 87 percent of all students were involved in at least one activity. We believe this high participation rate is part of the prevention piece of the equation.

To further identify the scope of substance abuse in Illinois, Seneca High School will be participating in the Illinois Youth Survey in the next school semester. The Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) has funded the administration of the Illinois Youth Survey since 1993. The survey is designed to gather information about a variety of health and social indicators, including substance use patterns and attitudes of Illinois youth. The information gathered during this survey will be used to identify future educational needs and programs. We anticipate both our Sophomore and Senior classes participating in this survey at the end of January. Please visit this website, https://iys.cprd.illinois.edu, for additional information. - * Congratulations to the Boys and Girls Cross Country Teams as they were Sectional qualifiers. Individually, the Boys Cross Country team qualified for the IHSA Class A State meet in Peoria on November 4th. Congratulations to Christopher Collet who individually placed 10th in the state and earned All-State honors.
- * Our Newark-Seneca Soccer coop team played the first 2 soccer games ever at SHS, which resulted in big wins for the team.

Notes from our school psychologist, Jill Rockrohr

As we focus on the importance of making an impact, I would like to approach this topic from a different perspective. We all know that when we focus our time and resources on helping others, we are providing a positive benefit to those we are helping. However, there is also a growing body of research that suggests that helping others has a positive psychological impact on the helper as well. In particular, teens are greatly impacted by volunteering and becoming involved in the community. In fact, research indicates that service to others affects behavior, development, self-image, future outcomes, and even *physical health*.

Studies have shown that teens who volunteer at least one hour per week are 50% less likely to abuse alcohol and drugs. Students who volunteer typically perform better academically and are more likely to graduate, avoid teen pregnancy, and vote as adults. Community service increases an adolescent's sense of belonging, purpose, and self-worth. Service to others during adolescence has been linked to better leadership skills such as problem-solving and decision-making skills. Studies show that adults who volunteered during their teen years have a stronger work ethic and are three times more likely to volunteer as adults than their peers who have not.

There are health benefits as well. In the short term, helping others causes a "helper's high" – feelings of empathy toward others lower our own stress response and strengthen our immunity. Research on the long-term effects of service to others supports a decrease in depression and an increase in life expectancy for those who regularly volunteer.

Many teens may want to become involved but may not know how to start. Here are some tips on how to help your student get started:

- Talk to your child about volunteering and consider volunteering together.
- Look for service opportunities that are in line with your child's interests. Opportunities abound in school, through friends, and even online. One avenue may be to partner with local hospitals or community centers, while others may find it a better fit to raise funds or gather supplies.
- Help your child stay committed to the service activity he or she chooses. Stress the importance of responsibility and follow-through.
- Follow-up with your child following a service activity to talk about what they enjoyed, what they might do differently, and how it made them feel.

Making an Impact for a Worldly Cause: Although Seneca and the nearby communities are great places to live, we can be somewhat sheltered. Sometimes, we don't realize that there is so much more going on in the world. It's not only important just to acknowledge issues outside our small town; we need to do something about those issues, as well. Seneca High School junior Marissa Holmes is doing just that. She has teamed up with UNICEF to raise money for Syrian children refugees by hosting a fundraiser and a bake sale. She sold treats during all three lunches, and it turned out much better than she was expecting: "We actually exceeded our goals for the project. We sold out of all of the food on the first day, so I had to go home and bake a ton for the next."

Marissa has been interested in service for some time and is an aspiring humanitarian. Her inspiration for the project comes from her love of children and her drive to take action. "I was tired of simply watching [humanitarians] on Instagram, so I wanted to actually do something about it," stated Holmes.

Marissa's impactful actions will not end with the great cause of UNICEF. In the future, she plans to volunteer at the PADS homeless shelter, and she eventually wants to join the Peace Corps. As far as her next project, she would like to do another fundraiser, this time with Patagonia, involving the reduction in size of the Bears Ears Monument.

Making an impact does not always have to be a headlining item on the six o'clock news. Brightening someone else's day, volunteering in one's community, or raising money for a national cause like UNICEF all have a positive effect. It takes drive and compassion like Marissa's to truly make an impact. Her actions should inspire all of us at SHS to put our abilities and talents to work for others.







Impacting The Community



SHS Science teacher, Terry Maxwell, who is the club advisor for the *Seneca High School Fellowship of Christian Athletes Group* (FCA), reports that the group has participated in valuable and needed service work during the Fall semester of 2017. The FCA kicked off the school year by assembling a group of over thirty students to volunteer at the *Feed My Starving Children* facilities in Aurora, IL on September 16th. Feed My Starving Children is a program that boxes and distributes food to seventy underdeveloped and impoverished nations such as Ghana and Haiti. The SHS FCA members served for two hours filling and sealing bags of food called "ManaPacks". Volunteers from all over the Chicagoland area serve at the Feed My Starving Children facilities. On the night of September 16th, the SHS FCA served along with 200 other volunteers at the Aurora Feed My Starving Children location. That night over 60,000 meals were packed in boxes to be shipped out to people in need!

The SHS FCA also helped feed the hungry locally with its **Second Annual Trick or SOUP event**. Trick or SOUP is an event in which FCA members walk around town and collect food that the people of Seneca graciously donate. Following the food drive, the donations are taken to the **Seneca Food Pantry** located at the **First United Methodist Church**. The SHS FCA collected about 1500 pounds of food from the members of the community. The Seneca Food Pantry was very appreciative of the help provided through this FCA project. Thank you to all of the community donations, the FCA student members, and to the adult volunteers that helped to **make an impact** in feeding those in need. We hope to continue to serve and volunteer in the local community and beyond throughout the rest of the year. A special thanks to the adult chaperones who gave their time and service as well: SHS teachers Fran Ogden, Eric Vroman, and Dan Baker; Seneca High Board Member Cory Yandell and his family; SHS Athletic Trainer Chris Jackson and family; Seneca Grade School Teacher Tim Brungard, and the Maxwell family.

A Veterans Day Assembly





Jason Baker with the United States Air Force. Major Baker was the guest speaker at our school's Veterans Day Assembly on November 10, 2017. Baker was already interested in joining the military before he graduated high school, but after the 911 attacks on the US, he knew for sure that he wanted to enlist. After graduating SHS in 2002, he went immediately into the ROTC program at the University of Illinois, where he graduated and became an officer. Earning his title as a major in the Air Force, Baker has flown over 1200 hours, with over half of those hours occurring during combat. Major Baker has a high level, high stress duty as he directs Command, Control & Intelligence to air support and ground forces below. He has been deployed several times to Afghanistan and Libya, as well as serving in combat missions against ISIS. Currently, one of Major Baker's tasks is to instruct new aircrew members to prepare them to be combat ready.

As he addressed the student body, staff, and all in attendance, Major Baker made it clear that we all need to take the time to not only *thank* our enlisted and retired military men and women each

year on Veterans Day but also to take the time to *listen* to them as well: "Talk to them. Ask them questions...and then take the time to really listen to their stories. We need to use each Veterans Day to re-focus our commitment to honoring veterans' service."

Major Baker also wanted to stress that "Veterans are represented by every corner of America, and every walk of life. We are men and women from every race, ethnicity, religion, gender identity, sexual orientation, political leaning, and socio-economic background. While representing just 7% of the country's population, we are clearly the most diverse group of people in the nation. And BECAUSE of this, and not in spite of it, we are the best at what we do. " He told the crowd that through diversity and unity our military has what it takes to make our county a safer place to live. Major Baker spoke from his heart to an intently listening audience, as he reminded us of the *impact* that veterans make each and every day!

The assembly was brought to a close with the annual tribute of the *Armed Forces on Parade* by the SHS Chorus and Band. FFA members read aloud poems honoring our veterans and then called out the names of SHS alumni who are serving in our armed forces. Katie Lawrence and Ryann Kenney performed *Taps*, and lastly, the American Legion Vets retired the colors. A big thanks to all of the veterans who attended and to

Q & A with cake artist Miss Johanna Wyss:

Q: How did you become part of the Team Sugar Slashers?

I did not happen to have anything better going on the week they were filming, so I figured I would go along for the ride and see what happened. It was that simple!

Q: What were some of the highlights and difficulties (if any) during the Halloween Wars competition?

A: The show was one of the hardest things I have ever done. That clock you see ticking during competitions is totally real; you don't have any time to work with, and you have producers supervising your every move and stirring things up! It is not the place where you do your proudest or cleanest work, but it is quite an experience.

Q: What about other events that you have participated in recently?

A: I have competed in professional cake decorating competitions around the country, such as Pastry Live in Georgia and That Takes the Cake in Texas. To be honest I much prefer those to the televised competitions; they have much less drama and are more focused on actual technique.

Q: (Re: Alice Cooper & Robert Englund) What was it like to meet someone so famous? Have you met any other famous people?

A: Both Alice and Robert were total class acts, friendly, charming, and totally witty in person. It is always both a relief and delight when you meet famous people and they are actually great in real life-that is not always the case. I have also been lucky enough to get to meet and work with pastry chefs and cake decorators who are not household names but who are huge celebrities to me. That means a lot.

Q: How did this love of baking and art get started?

A: I do not remember a time when baking and art were not the center of my universe...I am just programed this way!

Q: Do you credit any of your success to art classes taken at Seneca High?

A: Growing up in a small town, art class was a huge source of refuge. I somehow convinced administration that I needed double art my senior year and having that time and space designated for creation was so important to me. The support of Mr. Decker and Mr. Applebee still mean a lot to me to this day. They let me make some pretty strange and macabre art and always trusted and encouraged me, even when other people did not. I still can hear Mr. Applebee urging me not to throw art projects out every time I am tempted to do so! I have to give a shout out to Mrs. Read for learning along with me about how FCCLA competitions work. I hope people take advantage of the opportunities available there!

Q: Education or training after High School?

A: Attending Joliet Junior College's culinary arts program was one of the best decisions I have ever made. Initially I went because the college was accessible and affordable, but I soon realized that I had tapped into a wealth of resources and experiences that I am confident rival any of the "top" culinary schools in the country! I will never understand why people knock community college.

Q: What will you be tackling next?

A: While I do not think I will be seeking out any more televised competitions any time soon, I will continue to enter as many industry competitions as time allows. I am also always seeking out ways to travel and learn about pastry craft abroad, so I will probably be snooping around for more opportunities like that!

Swon has started, for his SAE project this year, the "Park Your Caps" project.
